

When I arrived on scene, all officers and sergeants were inside the residence along with AFR personnel. I saw a male adult lying on a backboard, or possibly a gurney at floor level. The male was speaking to the paramedics. I did not go inside but instead remained on the balcony until AFR removed the male from the apartment. This took approximately 5 minutes from the time I had arrived. During those 5 minutes I advised the residents from the adjoining apartments that it was safe to go back into their apartments. I saw Officer Schuster carrying wires from a Taser cartridge and asked if the male had been Tased. Officer Schuster stated he had.

I then entered into the living room of the apartment and requested from Officer Wesel if I could be of assistance. She stated that the male (identified by Officer Wesel as Nicholas Hanson) requested that his candles be blown out. Officer Schuster and I went through the apartment, checking each room for burning candles. However none were located. While searching for candles I noticed two empty boxes in the kitchen for what appeared to be sleeping pills. I also noticed three partially empty bottles of wine on the kitchen table. There was a knife lying on the floor near the front door and another in the living room on the coffee table. On the kitchen table was a full display of kitchen knives which appeared to be undisturbed.

I then left the inside of the apartment. Officer Schuster and I attempted to get the front door closed to the best of our abilities but it would not shut. The door jam was completely busted and two of the three hinges had been broken. Officer Schuster told me the door was like that because he had to kick it in using his foot in a "donkey kick". Sergeant Williams advised us to leave the door closed to the best of our abilities.

I then left the scene. I saw AFR driving down Lincoln St and turn left on E. Main St. with their emergency lights activated.

Sometime later in the evening, approximately an hour after leaving the scene, Sergeant Williams requested I place police tape across the door until it could be secured in an attempt to keep people from going into the unlocked apartment. When I arrived however the manager, William Koenigsberg, was already on scene. Koenigsberg had make-shifted a way to get the door locked with some pieces of wood.

Koenigsberg told me that he entered the apartment and placed some knives onto the kitchen table. He also told me he located a turtle on the couch and placed it into the bath tub. Koenigsberg told me he had been called by a tenant about a possible fight which occurred in the apartment and another tenant reported the door not being shut completely.

I advised Koenigsberg not to enter the apartment any further and he would be contacted by either a sergeant or Officer Wesel. I checked the door to ensure it was locked. I then left the scene and advised Sergeant Williams that the door had been secured by the manager.

At approximately 0150 hours, Sergeant Williams requested I go to 135 Lincoln St #20 and secure the apartment. I was parked outside the apartment until approximately 0250 hours when Officer Evans relieved me.
