

Taser, which eliminated the ability to administer another shot. The probes were still attached to Hanson awaiting AFR to properly remove them. Sgt. Selby then unhandcuffed one hand of Hanson's so he would be able to lie on his back. She then handcuffed him to the gurney to insure the paramedic's safety, Hanson's safety and officers. Officer Hull arrived on scene; refer to 'his report for his details. AFR then carried Hanson out to the ambulance.

I stayed inside and looked around to try to identify the blue substance. At this time I thought the Unisom came in hard pill form, I later learned it was actually came in a blue gel-liquid filled capsule. While looking I found a bottle of wine with about a quarter missing out of it next to the computer in Hanson's room. On the computer I found a note that looked to be addressed to some of his friends with statements saying he was "So sorry." It appeared to be a suicide note; I printed a copy from his computer. Two pages printed, there were two separate notes. I collected those incase the mental health worker needed to see them.

I retrieved the knife I had thrown outside and placed it back on the coffee table. When I did that I noticed a second knife sitting on the table. A silver pocket type knife had also been on the table with one of its blades fully extended. The blade was approximately 3". This concluded my business at the apartment. Sgt. Selby stated she would ride to the hospital with AFR to ensure Hanson didn't become combative again. I notified Sgt. Williams officers were unable to secure Hanson's apartment to do the damage to the door. He advised to leave it and he would contact the manager. Refer to his report for further details. I returned to the station to begin my report as it was the end of my shift.

Officer Schuster and I both began our reports when he received a call from Sgt. Selby advising Hanson had died. I heard Officer Schuster say, "He didn't make it?" "Are you serious?" he then looked at me and told me "He didn't make it" Officer Schuster said Sgt. Selby advised him prior to disconnecting she was on her way back to the city and was going to have her shoulder checked out at Ashland Community Hospital. Officer Schuster and I briefed Sgt Williams and Officer Hull who were in the briefing room. Sgt Williams told Officer Hull to go and secure Hanson's house. I don't know what time it was but Officer Hull later came back to the station and gave me a business card with the apartment manger, William Koenigsberg, name on it stating he had already fixed the door so it could secure. He also stated Koenigsberg found a live turtle on the couch next to the door and put it in the bathroom tub.

Sgt. Selby then called Officer Schuster again in the report writing room. I spoke with Sgt. Selby about whether we needed to secure the house, collect items and/or contact Hanson's parents. Sgt Selby advised the hospital had called Hanson's parents and that we didn't need to secure the house. She stated "It's not a crime scene, treat it like an unattended death." I hung up the phone and met with Sgt. Williams who said no detectives were going to be called out per Master Sgt. Smith. I told him Officer Schuster and I were going to go out to the house and take some photos and collect some of the pertinent items. Officer Schuster called Koenigsberg and asked him to meet us at the apartments at 0025 hours, which he did. We retrieved a key and went back into the house.

Koenigsberg stated he had gone into the house to fix the door and moved a couple pillows on the couch, which is how he found the turtle. He said he also saw the two knives on the table and moved them to the kitchen table. He said that was all he moved.

Officer Schuster took a swab from the cup Hanson was drinking from while I took a swab from the pool of blue liquid on the floor where Hanson had fallen. I then took pictures of the apartment rooms
